

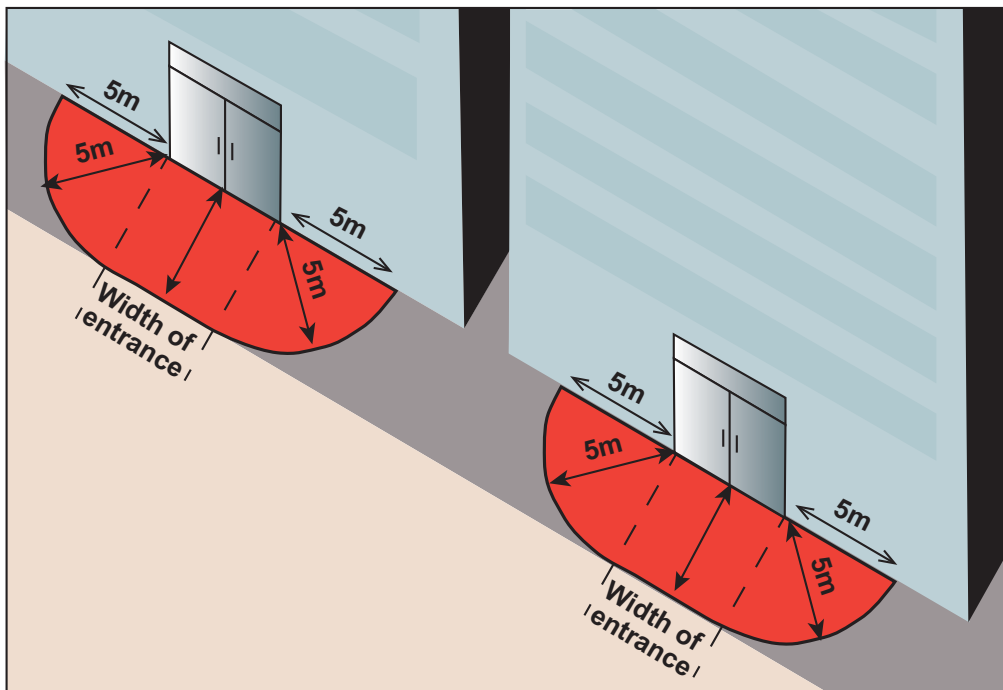



No smoking outside enclosed public places legislation

Smoking is not allowed within 5 metres of a public entrance to an enclosed public place and within 10 metres of air conditioning intakes.

Existing restrictions on smoking inside enclosed public places mean that smokers are required to smoke outdoors. Problems arise when smokers cluster around building entrances and exits, and near air conditioning intake vents to smoke. People entering and exiting the building are exposed to environmental tobacco smoke (ETS) and there may be problems with smoke drift into indoor smoke-free areas.

These restrictions reduce exposure of the public and employees to ETS, minimise the risk of smoke drift, and contribute to the de-normalisation of smoking in the community. This buffer zone has existed for Western Australian State Government buildings since 1 January 2005.
